



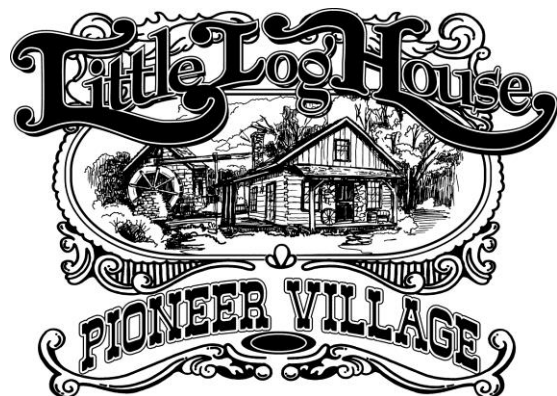
## The Brewster Carriage Company

Brewster has long been considered the Cadillac of horse drawn vehicles and its reputation for fine craftsmanship and elegance persists today. The original Brewster, William, arrived in Plymouth Massachusetts on the Mayflower. James Brewster was introduced to New Haven Connecticut when his stagecoach broke down in 1809. A year later he opened his first carriage shop. Starting with the manufacture of improved wagons, he turned his talents to the construction of fine vehicles normally credited to English manufacturers. The line included buggies, phaetons, victorias, and other equipment.



The reputation of the Brewster firm spread to include such famous customers at President Andrew Jackson and Vice President Martin Van Buren. For over 100 years, the name of Brewster has been associated with the finest carriages and automobile bodies that money could buy. There were over a half-dozen different firms with Brewster in their title, and they were all related in one way or another to James Brewster, the Connecticut native whose roots went deep into American history
